Interview with County Commissioner Bryan King

On July 2, I interviewed County Commissioner Bryan King at his home in Rutherfordton. This is Mr. King's first year as County Commissioner. He was not only elected to be a commissioner but his colleagues elected the Chairmen as well. The fellow commissioners chose him as chairman because of his exceptional leadership skills he has gained from past experiences. Mr. King has a plethora of passed experienced that has helped him to assume the role as county commissioner.
